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## I. A PROFILE OF SILAPATHAR COLLEGE

The Silapathar College established in 1979 is located in the heart of a rapidly growing small township - Silapathar which is surrounded by villages of tribal and backward communities in the Dhemaji District of Assam.

The institution is permanently affiliated to the Dibrugarh University. It was brought under deficit system of grant-in-aid in 1992 and was subsequently provincialised in 2005 by the Government of Assam. The college registered under 2(f) and 12(b) of UGC Act 1956 was first accredited by NAAC at the B level with institutional score of 72.00 on 28 February, 2005. It was then, subsequently re-accredited (cycle 2) with CGPA of 2.62 as B Grade on 15 November, 2015.

The college provides education for Higher Secondary and Under Graduate levels in Arts and Science streams. Diploma & PG programme under the Directorate of Open and Distance Learning (DODL), Dibrugarh University & UG programme under Krishna Kanta Handiqui State Open University (KKHSOU) - both in distance mode are offered in the college.

## **7. DIBRUGARH UNIVERSITY REGULATIONS FOR THE UNDER GRADUATE ACADEMIC PROGRAMMES IN THE CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM (CBCS), 2018**

(With modifications in 2016 Regulations as recommended by the 121<sup>th</sup> Meeting of the Under Graduate Board held on 25.04.2019 and approved the 116<sup>th</sup> Meeting of the Academic Council, Dibrugarh University held on 30.04.2019)

### **7.1 Short title, definitions and commencement:**

These Regulations shall be called the Dibrugarh University Regulations for the Under Graduate Academic Programmes in the Choice Based Credit System, 2018. These Regulations shall be effective for the Courses of Study leading to the Bachelor Degree(s) in Arts (BA), Science (B.Sc.) and Commerce (B.Com), which shall be of three years duration comprising of six semesters. Hereinafter, it will be referred to as DU-UGCBCS Regulations, 2018. The Regulations shall come into effect from the Academic Session, 2019-2020.

The Regulations shall be applicable to the students enrolled in the aforementioned Academic Programmes under CBCS conducted by the Colleges/ Institutes affiliated to/ permitted by Dibrugarh University from the Academic session 2019-2020.

### **7.2 Short Title, Definitions and Commencement:**

#### **7.2.1 Definitions:**

- a) CBCS: CBCS means Choice Based Credit System. Choice Based Credit System is a flexible system of learning. 'Credit' defines the quantum of contents/ syllabus prescribed for a course and determines the number of hours of instruction required. This system permits students to-
  - 1 learn at their own pace
  - 1 choose electives from a wide range of Elective Courses offered for the programme
  - 1 undergo additional courses and acquire more than the required number of credits
  - 1 adopt an inter-disciplinary approach in learning
  - 1 make best use of the expertise of available faculty.
- b) College : The term 'College' means the Colleges and Institutes affiliated to or permitted by Dibrugarh University for conducting different academic programmes.
- c) Department: The term 'Department' is used to mean a Department of a College/ Institute affiliated to/permitted by Dibrugarh University.
- d) Programme: The term 'programme' is used to mean the whole learning experience or combination of courses in a particular field of study.
- e) Course : A Programme is divided into a number of courses. A course is a unit of instruction or segment of subject area under any programme. The traditional concept 'paper' is replaced by 'course'.
- f) Academic Year : An academic year means a period of twelve months consisting of two semesters.
- g) Semester : The word "semester" is used to mean a half-yearly term or term of studies including examinations, vacations and semester breaks.



- h) Semester Duration : A semester normally extends over a period of 15 class weeks. Each week has 30 hours of instruction spread over the week.
- i) In-semester : The word “in-semester” is used to refer to the continuous evaluation within the half-yearly term.
- j) End-semester : The word “end-semester” is used to refer to the terminal processes of examinations and evaluations at the end but within the half-yearly term.
- k) Credit : ‘Credit’ defines the quantum of contents/syllabus prescribed for a course and determines the number of hours of instruction required per week. Thus, normally in each of the course, credits will be assigned on the basis of the number of lectures/tutorials/ laboratory work and other forms of learning required to complete the course contents in a 14-15 week schedule :
  - i) 1 Lecture per week = 1 Hour duration per week = 1 Credit
  - ii) 1 Tutorial per week = 1 Hour duration per week = 1 Credit
  - iii) 1 Practical per week = 2 Hours duration per week = 1 Credit

*Note: The lecture sessions and tutorials shall not be substituted with any other activities like seminars, group discussions etc.*

#### **7.2.2 Semester Duration :**

- i) Odd Semesters : June – November (including end-semester examinations and semester breaks)
  - ii) Even Semester : December - May (including end-semester examinations and semester breaks)
- Any change in the Academic Calendar/Schedule may be made by the University whenever necessary.

#### **7.2.3 Academic Schedule:**

The Academic Schedule of the Bachelor degrees in Arts (BA), Science (B.Sc.) and (B.Com) Programmes under the CBCS shall be administered as per the Academic Calendar of the University published for every academic session.

#### **7.2.5 Admission Criteria:**

- (i) Newspaper Notice inviting applications for admission into the different programmes shall be issued by the Principals of the colleges/institutes as per the Academic Calendar of the University. The minimum eligibility for admission into the following Programmes shall be as below:

- a. **Bachelor of Arts (B.A.)** : A student passed the Higher Secondary Examination (10+2) of the Assam Higher Secondary Education Council, or an equivalent examination (10+2) recognized as such by the University.
- b. **Bachelor of Science (B.SC.)** : A student passed the Higher Secondary Examination (10+2) of the Assam Higher Secondary Education Council, or an equivalent examination (10+2) recognized as such by the University.

For admission into the B.Sc in Chemistry, Physics and Geology Honours, a candidate must pass the Higher Secondary Examination (10+2 recognized in Science Stream of the Assam Higher Secondary Education Council or an equivalent examination with passing Mathematics as a subject.



- (ii) The admission or eligibility criteria shall be fixed by the Academic Council from time to time whenever necessary. The University/colleges/institutes may also adopt own policy for admission or selection of eligible candidates for admission complying with the eligibility criteria prescribed in the clause 2.5(i).
- (iii) No student shall be eligible for admission to an Academic Programme in any discipline unless he/she has successfully passed the qualifying examination fulfilling the minimum eligibility criteria from a University/Institute recognized by Dibrugarh University.
- (iv) Statutory reservation policy of the government shall be followed in case of selection of eligible candidates for admission.

### 7.3 Course Structure:

7.3.1 The Course Structure of the Academic Programmes under the CBCS shall be as per the Course Structure given in **Annexure I**. The nature of the Courses for all Under Graduate Academic programmes shall be as below:

- a) **Core Courses** : Compulsory components of an Academic Programme. These Courses are to be compulsorily studied as a core requirement for the programme. The contents of the Core Courses shall be as per the UGC Model Curriculum for the subject/discipline concerned. However, the Boards of Studies concerned may recommend maximum of 20% deviation from the UGC Model Syllabi wherever requires.  
In case, UGC does not provide model Syllabi/Curriculum, the Board of Studies shall propose their own Core Courses keeping parity of total numbers of credits/courses with other similar subjects/disciplines.
- b) **Elective Courses** : Elective courses shall be chosen by each student from a pool of courses. These courses may be intra-departmental, i.e. Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) as well as inter-departmental, i.e., Generic Elective (GE). The students shall have to choose minimum number of DSE and GE in every semester as prescribed in the Course Structure. These courses shall be :
  - (i) supportive to the discipline of study
  - (ii) providing an expanded scope
  - (iii) enabling an exposure to some other discipline/domain
  - (iv) nurturing student proficiency/skillThere shall be a basket of at least eight Elective Courses having equal number of credits. For the students of the same discipline/subjects these elective courses shall be intra-disciplinary and shall be called DSE Courses. If the students of other discipline/subjects (within the Programme) opt these electives shall be considered as inter-disciplinary and shall be called GE courses.
- c) **Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC)** : The Ability Enhancement Courses shall be of two kinds- 'Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses' and 'Skill Enhancement Courses'.



These courses shall be inter-disciplinary (within the Programme) in nature. 'AEC' Courses are the courses based upon the content that leads to Knowledge enhancement.

- i. **Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC)** : (a) Environmental Science (2Credit), (b) Communicative English (2 Credit) and (c) Alternative English/ Communicative Hindi /MIL (2 Credit).

**For BA (Non Honours) Programmes, there shall be a Multi-disciplinary Course of 4 Credits.**

- ii. **Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) : (minimum 4 credits):** These courses may be chosen from a pool of courses designed to provide value-based and/or skill-based knowledge and should contain both theory and lab/hands-on/training/fieldwork. The main purpose of these courses is to provide students life-skills in hands-on mode so as to increase their employability. The list provided under this category are suggestive in nature and each University has complete freedom to suggest their own papers under this category based on their expertise, specialization, requirements, scope and need.

The List of Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) are given as **Annexure II**.

7.3.2 A Course may also take the form of a Dissertation/Project work/Practical training/Field work/Seminar, etc.

7.3.3 A student shall have to study the academic programme as per the scheme of the Programme. Even if a candidate earns the required number of credits before completion of the full duration of the programme, he/she shall not be entitled for the degree.

#### 7.4 Course Enrolment

7.4.1 The minimum and maximum credits to be opted by a student for qualifying of a graduate degree shall be as per the Course Structure given as **Annexure I**.

7.4.2 Change of Courses shall not be permitted after sending the records of the students to the University for registration.

#### 7.5 Attendance

7.5.1 The course teacher shall be responsible for maintaining a record of attendance of students who have enrolled for the course.

7.5.2 All course teachers shall intimate the Principal/Director of a college/Institute through the Head of the Department concerned at least thirty calendar days before the last instruction day in the semester; the particulars of all students who have less than 80% of attendance during the total number of class days.

7.5.3 A student who has less than 80% attendance in average shall not be permitted to sit for the End-semester examination.

Provided that it shall be open to the University to grant exemption to a student who has attended a minimum of 70% classes but failed to obtain the prescribed 80% attendance for valid reasons, on recommendation of the Head/Chairperson/Principals of the Department/Centre/College on payment of a prescribed fee(s).



The Principals of the Colleges shall announce the names of all students who shall not be eligible to take the End-semester examinations in the various courses and send a copy of the same to the Controller of Examinations. Such candidates shall have to repeat the concerned course (s) when it is offered next.

- 5.4 A student declared as discollegiate shall not be allowed to proceed to the next higher Semester. He/She shall need to pursue the Semester afresh in which he/she was declared as discollegiate along with the next fresh batch.

## 7.6 Examination and Evaluation:

- (a) Examination and evaluation shall be done on a continuous basis, at least three times during each semester.
- (b) There shall be 20% marks for internal assessment and 80% marks for End-semester examination in each course during every semester.
- (c) There shall be no provision for re-evaluation of the answer scripts of the end-semester examinations. However, a candidate may apply for re-scrutiny.
- (d) Internal Assessment:
  - (i) In internal assessment, different tools such as objective tests, written tests, assignments, paper presentation, laboratory work, etc. suitable to the courses may be employed. The Procedure for Internal Assessment is prescribed in **Annexure III**.
  - (ii) The students shall be informed in advance about the nature of assessment. Students shall be required to compulsorily attend internal assessment including appearing the Sessional Tests, failing which they will not be allowed to appear for the End-semester examination. A Student cannot repeat In-semester examinations. The department may arrange special in-semester examination whenever necessary.
- (e) End Semester Examination :
  - (i) There shall be one End semester examination carrying 80% Marks in each course of a Semester covering the entire syllabus prescribed for the Course. The End semester examination is normally a written/laboratory-based examination/Project Work/Dissertation.
  - (ii) The Controller of Examinations shall make necessary arrangements for notifying the dates of the End semester examinations and other procedures as per Dibrugarh University Rules (at least 20 days in advance) and the Academic Calendar notified by the University.
  - (iii) Normally, the End-semester examination for each course shall be of three hour duration.
- (f) Confidential Works : Setting of question papers, moderation of question papers, evaluation of answer scripts, scrutiny, tabulation of marks, etc. and announcement of results, shall be governed by the Dibrugarh University Examination Ordinance.
- (g) The mode of the conduct of the end-semester examinations of the practical/dissertation courses shall be partially external as below:
  - I. The end-semester examinations of all practical/dissertation courses shall be conducted



by a Board of Examiners consisting of the internal examiner (the concerned course teacher) and an external examiner appointed by the Controller of Examinations.

2. A student shall not be allowed to take more than one project work in a single semester.
- (h) The mode of end-semester examination and evaluation of the Course shall be specified in the detailed syllabus of the Course concerned.
- (i) End-semester Practical examinations shall normally be held before the theory examinations.
- (k) Betterment Examination :
- (i) A student shall be entitled to take the “betterment examinations” in any two theory courses of any of the six semesters after passing the Sixth Semester examination only once. In this case, the higher marks secured by the student shall be retained. The candidates shall have to apply for betterment examination within one year of passing the Sixth Semester examination.
- (ii) No betterment shall be allowed in the practical examinations.

### 7.7 Results and Progression:

- a) A candidate shall be declared as passed a course, provided he/she secures-
  - (i) at least 40% of marks in each Course in the End Semester Examinations.
  - (ii) at least ‘P’ grade in the 10 point scale combining both the in-semester and End Semester Examination performance.
  - (iii) There shall be no separate pass mark for Internal Assessment.
- b) A candidate shall be declared as passed a semester/programme, provided he/ she secures at least ‘P’ grade in the 10 point scale (given in clause) in all the Courses separately.
- c) There may be moderation of Internal Assessment marks/End Semester marks as and when necessary.
- d) The marks of In-semester examinations obtained by the candidate shall be carried over for declaring any result.
- e) A candidate who fails or does not appear in one or more courses of any end semester examinations up to Sixth Semester shall be provisionally promoted to the next higher semester with the failed course as carry over course(s). Such candidates will be eligible to appear in the carry over course in the next regular examinations of those courses.
- f) If a candidate clears the sixth semester examination before clearing all the courses of the previous semesters, the result of the sixth semester examination of that candidate shall be withheld and his/her results shall be announced only after he/she clears the courses of the previous semesters. A student must clear all his/her Semester Examinations within Six (6) years from the dates of admission to the First Semester of any Programme irrespective of the number of examinations appeared by the student, viz. First and Second Semester Examinations shall have to be cleared in



six consecutive chances, Third and Fourth Semester Examinations shall have to be cleared in five consecutive chances and Fifth and Sixth Semester Examinations in four consecutive chances. However, after the first chance of the Fifth and Sixth Semester Examinations, the candidate shall be considered as a non-regular candidate.

- g) Since the Semester system involves continuous assessment, there shall be no scope for a student to appear as a private candidate in any programme in this system.
- h) A candidate shall be declared to have passed the Bachelors Degree in the concerned discipline provided he/she has passed all the Semesters and in all the Courses separately.
- i) The Controller of Examinations shall declare the results of the DU-UG CBCS Examinations and issue Grade-sheets.
- j) The first rank holder of a programme shall be decided on the basis of the CGPA. However, the Overall Weighted Percentage of Marks (OWPM) of a candidate shall be considered in case of tie in CGPA.

## 7.8 Grading System

7.8.1 The absolute grading system shall be applied in evaluating performance of the students.

7.8.2 The following scale of grading system shall be applied to indicate the performances of students in terms of letter grade and grade points as given below:

\* Exclusive Class Interval technique shall be followed in calculation of Grade Point.

7.8.3 The Letter grade 'B<sup>+</sup>' and above shall be considered as First Class and Letter grade 'B' shall be considered as Second Class.

7.8.4 A student is considered to have completed a course successfully and earned the prescribed credits if he/she secures a letter grade other than F (Failed) or 'Abs' (Absent/Incomplete).

7.8.5 If a candidate secures 'F' grade in a Course, he/she shall have to reappear in the Course in the next legitimate chance.

7.8.6 If a student secures 'F' grade in Project Work/Dissertation/assignment etc., he/she shall have to re-submit it after necessary revisions. The Result shall be declared with next regular batch.



7.8.7 'Abs' grade shall be awarded to a candidate if he/she has not fulfilled the following requirements:

- (i) If a candidate fails to appear in any Course(s) in an end semester examination.
- (ii) If a candidate fails to submit the project work/dissertation/assignment of an end semester examination.
- (iii) If a candidate is certified as not eligible to appear in any course(s) in an end semester examination by the Course Teacher(s) due to insufficient attendance in lectures, tutorials, practical or field works.

7.8.8 The candidates not appearing in a Semester Examination shall be considered as an 'Abs' candidate and that will be reflected in the Grade Sheet of the candidate. These candidate shall have to convert the 'Abs' grade by appearing in the next examination on the Course (provided he/she has legitimate chance to appear the Course) concerned or by submitting project work/dissertation/assignment etc.

7.8.9 Results of the candidates appeared in the Betterment or Backlog Examinations shall not be counted for the award of Prizes/Medals, Rank or Distinction.

## 7.9 Transcript

The University may issue consolidated Transcript on payment of a prescribed fee which shall contain Letter grades, grade points and SGPA and CGPA mentioning the Course Titles in details, medium of instruction and programme duration.

## 7.10 Credit Transfer

Inter- Institutional transfer of Credits may be considered by the Dibrugarh University on reciprocal basis or in compliance with the relevant Guidelines of the UGC.

### 7.11 Rules for Admission on Transfer from other University:

- (a) The University shall allow admission on transfer of students from other Universities. However, such transfer shall be permissible provided that-
  - (i) both the Universities conduct the same degree programmes under the CBCS.
  - (ii) the course structure along with the nomenclature of the courses are similar between the two Universities,
  - (iii) the combination of courses opted by the candidate are not changed.
- (b) In fulfillment of the conditions as laid down in clause 11 (a) a candidate may be allowed to get admission on transfer from other Universities on production of transfer certificate, proof of classes attended, migration certificate, etc. not later than 1 (one) month from the commencement of the classes of the semester concerned. The records of class attendance, performance in internal assessment in his/her credit shall be carried over on admission and shall be computed for the purpose of examination.  
With such permission of transfer, the Credits earned by the student shall also be accepted by the University.
- (c) A candidate shall have to apply for transfer in the prescribed format of the University.



**7.12 General:**

- a. It shall be ensured that the University shall maintain fundamental code of professional ethics in implementing these Regulations.
- b. For any matter not covered under these Regulations for the DU UGCBCS Programmes, the existing Dibrugarh University Rules, Ordinances and the Dibrugarh University Act, 1965 (as amended) shall be applicable.
- c. The Dibrugarh University CBCS Board and/or the Examination Committee of the University shall remove any difficulty, which may arise in the course of operations relating to execution of the DU CBCS programmes.

**8. ATTENDANCE**

**a) HS COURSE**

Students attending **75%** or more classes shall be allowed to appear in the examination as **Regular Candidates**. Students attending 60% or more classes but less than 75% shall be allowed to appear at the examination as **Non-Collegiate Candidates** on payment of a Non-Collegiate Fee fixed by the AHSEC. A student attending less than 60% of classes shall be declared as **Dis-collegiate** and will be debarred from appearing in the Annual/Final Examination. **Penalty will be charged (prescribed by office from time to time) on the students who have failed to appear in the internal periodical examinations.** The holding of examination and declaration of the result of the Annual Examination will be regulated by the norms of the Assam Higher Secondary Education Council.

**9. DISTANCE EDUCATION PROGRAMMES :**

Considering the importance of the diverse needs of the locality, rapidly changing socio-economic scenario and the emerging trends of employment in the global market, the institution has introduced a series of programmes under the Krishna Kanta Handiqui State Open University (KKHSOU) and Directorate of Distance Education, Dibrugarh Universitys (DDE-DU). Under Graduate Programme in KKHSOU and Post-Graduate Programme in (DDE-DU) are offered.

**10. CAREER AND COUNSELLING**

The college has a Career and Counselling Cell to guide the students in choosing career options. It is intended to enable the students to identify promising career options and enhance interview & job skills. Mrs. Anindita Chakravarty, Assistant Professor, Department of Economics and Dr. Shreemoyee Phukan, Assistant Professor, Department of Chemistry are the coordinators of the cell.

**11. NSS**

An important organization of this college is NSS which renders benevolent services to society for upliftment and inculcates spirit of fellow-feeling. Raju Pegu, Assistant Professor, Department of English is the Programme Officer.

**12. RED RIBBON CLUB:**

Red Ribbon Club is a movement started by the Government of India in Schools and Colleges through which, students will spread awareness over HIV/AIDS. It envisages instilling charity mind among all the students to extend their able help towards developing healthy life styles, donating blood to all the needy by promotion of regular voluntary blood donation.

With an aim to create awareness on HIV/AIDS, the Assam State Aids Control Society (ASACS) has formed a number of Red Ribbon Clubs (RRCs) in the schools and colleges of the state through the National Service Scheme (NSS) as the nodal agency for RRC. Dr. Abdul Mutalib, Assistant Professor, Department of Sociology is the coordinator of Silapathar College RRC.

**13. ECO CLUB:**

National Green Corps (NGC) is a major initiative of Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change (MoEFCC) for creating environmental awareness launched in 2001-02. It aims at building cadres of young children working towards environmental conservation and sustainable development. The phenomenal response that NGC received has made the network with more than 1,00,000 Eco Clubs across the country in 16 years. This is one of the largest conservation networks at grass root level in taking the environment awareness among the masses. Silapathar College has also set up Eco Club from the session 2018-19 with Dr. Abdul Mutalib, Assistant



Professor of Sociology as the Coordinator.

**14. Environment Climate Cell :**

Silapathar College has constituted an Environment Climate Cell in order to make the students as well as teachers aware about the environmental issues and challenges and impart them to disseminate the information and sensitize the school children and society. The main objective of this cell are to provide opportunities to acquire knowledge, skills, attitude, commitment to preserve the environment, to make them understand the interdependence of economic, social and ecological factors etc. Dr. Upen Deka, Asstt. prof. Deptt. of Botany is the co-ordinator of this cell.

**15. Yoga and Meditation Centre:**

Considering the importance of practicing yoga to improve flexibility, balance, endurance and physical strength while meditation helps to keep the mind sharp and clean relieves stress and improves overall well being, the college has Yoga and Meditation centre to promote health benefits among the faculty and students through Yoga and Meditation. The centre celebrates International Day of Yoga every year since its inception. Techniques of meditation and various postures are performed to lead a healthy and stress free life. Dr. Junali Chetia, Asstt. Profr. Deptt. of Botany is the coordiantor of this centre.

**16. Entrepreneurship Cell:**

The College has constituted an Entrepreneurship Cell which addresses all the needs of students to become dynamic entrepreneur. The main objectives of this cell is to create awareness on Entrepreneurship among the students through training programmes and campus to enhance industry, institute interaction through guest lectures and industrial visits. Dr. Dilip Saikia, Asstt. Professor, Deptt. of Physics is the coordinator of this cell.

**17. SEMINARS & WORKSHOPS**

To provide a platform for exchanging scholarly views and sharing expertise among the teachers, state and national seminars and workshops are organized by the college from time to time. Through such academic exercises, teachers are expected to widen their knowledge and experience and get inspired in research. Students are also given opportunity to enhance their learning experiences through such programmes.

**18. GUARDIAN FEEDBACK MECHANISM**

The college has also an in-built Guardian Feedback Mechanism wherein the responsibilities of the Guardians and the institution are thoroughly discussed in the meetings held.

**19. INTER-COLLEGE FACULTY EXCHANGE PROGRAMME**

Silapathar College has also introduced Inter-college Faculty Exchange Programme inviting faculty members to deliver lectures on mutual basis from adjoining colleges.

**20. INTER-COLLEGE STUDENT EXCHANGE PROGRAMME**



The college organises inter-college student exchange programme from time to time where students from other institutions are invited for interaction and exchange of ideas. Similarly, students from our institution shall also attend such programmes as and when invited.

## 21. ADMISSION PROCEDURE

Admission procedure in the college has been upgraded to Online System from this 2017-18 session. Students have to visit the official college website [www.silapatharcollege.edu.in](http://www.silapatharcollege.edu.in) wherein online admission and guidelines is displayed on the right hand corner of the home page. Students need to click and follow the steps accordingly.

However, hard copy of documents as required should be submitted to the office at the time of admission.

The reservation policy will be followed as per Govt. rules at the time of Admission.

As per the direction of the Govt. there is provision for free admission (except Students' Union Fee) on submission of following documents:

- i) BPL certificate and
- ii) Evidence (photograph) of plantation of tree.

### Note :

- Students having less than 40% marks in aggregate need not apply for admission. However, relaxation of 5% is provided for SC/ST students.
- Students must have H.S. (10+2) pass and obtained atleast 45% marks in aggregate and 50% marks in concern (Honours) subject.
- The college authority shall have the right to reject admission to any one without assigning any reason thereof.

## 22. DECLARATION

A DECLARATION form will have to signed by the student as well as the Guardian at the time of admission for maintenance of strict maintain discipline either individually or in a body in the college campus. Any student found to have detrimental conduct to academic environment of the college shall attract severe punishment which may lead to expulsion from the college. (*Declaration forms are attached as **Annexure IV, V, VI & VII***).

## 23. RESERVATION OF SEATS

Reservation of seats is provided as per Govt. rules for:

- a) 2% for Sports Persons of sports recognized by IOA/SAI and aslo have represented District/ State etc.
- b) 1% for wards of employees of the Colleges
- c) 1% for NCC/Scouts/Guides.



- d) 1% for the Students with achievements in cultural activities.

## 24. UNIFORM

Wearing of uniform in the college campus by students is mandatory. Any student found without uniform is not allowed to attend classes or transact any matter in the college office. The uniform of the college is described below:

- i) For Boys: Black trouser (long pant) and light blue shirt.
- ii) For Girls: Light blue churidar kurta with white dupatta.
- iii) For both Boys and Girls : Black sweater.

## 25. GENERAL RULES

- i) Every student of the college must strictly maintain discipline either individually or in a body in the college campus. Any student found to have a conduct detrimental to academic environment of the college shall immediately be expelled from the college.
- ii) Every student of the college is a member of the Silapathar College Students' Union and, therefore, he/she will have to participate in any event organized by the union. The Union will have to function within the framework of its constitution.
- iii) All notices/posters/banners desired to be circulated on the notice board or elsewhere within the college campus shall require prior permission of the Principal.
- iv) The signature of the Principal on the Identity Card must be obtained within 15 days from the date of admission. The Identity Card must be kept in possession by all students in the college campus all the time.
- v) All the office bearers of the Students' Union must submit their audited accounts and allied documents/materials to the Principal at the end of academic session immediately before filling up the forms for examination.
- vi) All students including the office bearers of the Union must obtain Library Clearance Certificate from the authority concerned before filling up forms for examination.
- vii) Damage or destruction of college properties and involvement in causing disruption of normal functioning of classes is treated as punishable offence which may lead to imposition of fine along with expulsion from the college.
- viii) Indecent behaviour by students towards teachers and employees of the college will be seriously dealt with.
- ix) Use of drugs, cigar and other narcotic substances is strictly prohibited.
- x) Tearing of library books, journals, etc will lead to punishment along with due compensation.
- xi) Wearing of uniform in indecent way, bearing of informal haircut etc. are strictly prohibited.



- xii) Use of mobile phone is normally not allowed in the college campus.

## 26. STUDENTS' SUPPORT SYSTEM

### a) STUDENTS' ORGANISATION

Silapathar College Students' Union (SCSU) is the only bonafide students' organization in the college. No other students' body is allowed in the college campus. The objective of having this union body is to train the students' tolerance and democratic values by getting them involved in it. The office bearers of the union are elected annually by the students.

### b) STUDENTS' ADALAT

Silapathar College aims to ensure that every student has equal access to competent and qualitative teaching which leads to vibrant academic, social and personal growth. To this end, the college has adopted a student charter wherein the students and the teachers meet on the 1st Saturday of every month to encourage the students in continuous and comprehensive learning and progression.

### c) FREE STUDENTSHIP

There is also a provision of free studentship for the students who belong to any of the following categories:

- a) Poor and meritorious students
- b) Physically challenged

Students desirous of availing the facility have to apply to the Principal with documentary evidence. However, if the Government declares Fee Waiver Scheme to the student then this scheme will be opened to the student within the state but those student who belongs to poor and meritorious out side the state can avail the free studentship on submission of application with documentary evidence to the principal.

### d) SCHOLARSHIP

- (i) Post-matric scholarships for students of the college belonging to SC/ST/OBC and MOBC are awarded as prescribed by the Govt.
- (ii) National Merit Scholarship
- (iii) State Merit Scholarship

In addition to the above scholarships, the following awards, prizes and certificates are awarded to the brilliant students of this college:

- i) A Cash Prize of Rs. 10,000.00 (Ten thousand) and a Certificate of Merit to the student of this college who secures a position among the first ten successful candidates of Assam in H.S. Examination.
- ii) A Cash Prize of Rs. 5000.00 (Five thousand) and a Certificate of Merit to the H.S. student of this college securing highest marks in History in the State and to Under Graduate student securing highest marks in History Honours in Dibrugarh University



in the Final examination will be awarded by Dr. L.N. Pegu, Principal of this college in memory of **Late Deben Pegu**.

e) **STUDENTS' AID FUND**

- (i) **Project work** : On the basis of the recommendation of Research Committee Rs. 10,000/- will be provided to the aspiring student for project work.
- (ii) **Book Bank** : Under the scheme of Book Bank facility, loan of text books are given to poor and meritorious students.

**27. LIBRARY**

The college has a well-equipped automated library with a stock of 20592 text books, 1241 references, 12 journals, 10 magazines and 6 newspapers. In addition, there is provision for free and open access to e-resource centre wherein about 1 lakh plus e-books and 3000 plus e-journals are enlisted.

**28. LANGUAGE LAB**

The college has a fully air-conditioned 31 plus computers Language Lab with video conferencing facility. The students are given free access.

**29. SCIENCE LABORATORY:** The college has well established Science Laboratory with latest equipments.

**30. WOMEN'S HOSTEL**

The college has a Girls' Hostel with adequate amenities. Students seeking seats in the hostel must fill in a separate Hostel Admission Form obtainable from the college office which have to be submitted within stipulated time. All boarders must abide by the following rules and regulations:

- (i) The boarders must maintain decent, dignified and disciplined principle of life in and outside the hostel.
- (ii) No visitor is allowed to meet any boarder without the permission of the hostel superintendent.
- (iii) Use of mobile phone is normally not allowed.
- (iv) All boarders must follow the mess rules in force in the hostel.
- (v) Violation of hostel rules will be seriously treated as punishable offence which may lead to expulsion from the hostel as well as the college.
- (vi) Damage of hostel property caused by any boarder will attract punishment along with charging of compensation. Depending upon the nature and reason of damage, she may be expelled from the hostel as well as the college.



- (vii) For maintenance of proper sanitary hygiene within the hostel, Napkine Incinerator is installed. The boarders shall have to use the same when needed.

### 31. PUBLICATIONS

#### a) BOOKS

The college has a Publication Board which publishes ISBN books and seminar volumes from time to time.

#### b) JOURNALS

The Silapathar College Students' Union has a mouthpiece entitled "SILAPATHAR COLLEGE MAGAZINE" which is published annually. The magazine serves as the vehicle of reflecting intellectual world of the students' community.

- ii) **Department of Economics:** The annual magazine of the department is "Pragati". It is published with the intent to make a sincere effort to reflect knowledge and original ideas of the students on current & emerging economic issues.
- iii) **Department of English:** "Nurture", an annual magazine of the department has been publishing yearly to enhance the knowledge of the students in the world of literature.

**32. FACILITIES**

**a) DIGITAL CLASSROOM**

The digital turn in education has been described across a wide range of initiatives and processes. These include the introduction of digital tools and gadgets as a part of the learning environment, building digital archives and repositories of learning. Keeping in consonance with the present digital world, Silapathar College has installed digital classrooms to partially replace traditional classroom teaching for benefit of the students.

**b) VIRTUAL CLASS ROOM**

Silapathar College has a hi-tech state of the art Virtual class room. It will help develop new tools to enrich course-work, enhance flexibility, and attract the best students and faculty. Virtual class room lets institutions of higher education reach students anywhere, anytime, by blending fully interactive and recordable audio, video, and web conferencing capabilities. With these proven, powerful tools, educational institutions can extend the walls of their classrooms in both space and time, and bring the rest of the world to their campuses.

**c) MULTIPURPOSE GYMNASIUM:**

Multipurpose Gymnasium is constructed under Sports Infrastructure Grants UGC of XII plan period with state of the art facilities.

**d) HEALTH CARE CENTRE:**

The college has a Health Care Centre with essential infrastructure and first aid medicines to promote physical, mental & social well being of the students. A part time physician and a nurse have been appointed for health check up. The college intends to provide health care information and become an important source of services for faculty, staff and students of the



college. Besides for maintaining proper sanitary hygiene of the girl students, Sanitary Napkin Pad Incinerator installed at Girls' Common Room and Women's Hostel.

**e) MINI MUSEUM**

To show case the rich traditional and cultural heritage of the tribal and indigenous people of the North East, Silapathar College had established a mini museum under the UGC sponsored Tribal Study Centre in 2007.

**f) VERMI COMPOST**

The college has also started to recycle bio-waste by forming Vermi Compost Units in the college. Vermi composting is the process of using earthworms to turn organic wastes into very high-quality compost. The worm casts contain five times more nitrogen, seven times more phosphorus and 11 times more potassium than ordinary soil, nutrients essential for healthy plant growth.

**Overview** : The Dibrugarh University has introduced CBCS system in UG courses with effect from the academic session 2019-20. There are six semesters in UG courses over a period of three calendar years. The schedule for the semester system is as follows: First, third and fifth Semester (including examination): August to December; Second, fourth and sixth Semester (including examination): January to June. In CBCS, broadly there are two programmes: 1. B.Sc (Honours) 2. B.Sc (Regular). The details of BSc (Honours and Regular) programme for Semester are as follows:

In **Semester –I B.Sc (Honours)**: One subject (Core course), English communication and one Generic Elective (GE) subject (Core course and GE must be two different subjects)

In **Semester -II B.Sc (Honours)**: One subject (Core course), one Generic Elective (GE) subject (Core course and GE must be two different subjects). Environmental Science (Ability Enhancement Course) is compulsory for students of all programmes.

In **Semester -III B.Sc (Honours)**: One subject (Core course), one skill enhancement course and one Generic Elective (GE) subject (Core course and GE must be two different subjects).

In **Semester -IV B.Sc (Honours)**: One subject (Core course), one skill enhancement course and one Generic Elective (GE) subject (Core course and GE must be two different subjects).

In **Semester –V B.Sc (Honours)**: One subject (Core course) and one discipline specific elective.

In **Semester -VI B.Sc (Honours)**: One subject (Core course) and one discipline specific elective.

A student's performance in the CBCS semester system shall be monitored throughout the semester by continuous assessment in both theory and practical papers. Evaluation in each theory and practical paper will be as follows:

**Internal evaluation:** 20% marks (includes sessional examinations/home assignments/ seminars/ group discussion)

**External evaluation:** 80% marks

Internal evaluation shall be based on sessional examinations, home assignments, class attendance, seminars, group discussion etc. in each semester while external evaluation shall be through a final examination at the end of the semester conducted by Dibrugarh University. Students must secure pass marks in both internal and external examinations separately. Programme Subjects to be taken Students must have minimum 75% class attendance for appearing the examination.

### **Internal assessment and evaluation system (IAES)**

The college has introduced the internal assessment and evaluation system (IAES) to satisfy the norms of continuous and comprehensive evaluation of students is primarily based on the following parameters

1. Class attendance/ regularity of students in different subjects
2. Attendance in test/terminal examinations, unit test and marks secured/progress in these tests
3. Use of library services by the students.
4. Participation in seminars/discussions etc.
5. Participation in co-curricular activities
6. Teachers comments/views on a student
7. Performance in Home Assignments etc.

Students are advised to fulfil different preconditions satisfactorily to secure a higher grade in IAES. Moreover, under the Semester System in Under Graduate level under Dibrugarh University, the following norms and procedures will be followed for internal Assessment and evaluation.

1. 20% of the total marks of each paper will be allotted as the marks for Internal Assessment.
2. The marks distribution of Internal Assessment from the allotted 20% marks is as follows
  - \* 25% from overall attendance of student
  - \* 25% from 1<sup>st</sup> Sessional Examination (SEI)
  - \* 25% from 2<sup>nd</sup> Sessional Examination (SEII)
  - \* 25% from Seminar, group Discussion etc.

The Dibrugarh University has introduced CBCS system in UG courses with effect from the academic session 2019-20. There are six semesters in UG courses over a period of three calendar years. The schedule for the semester system is as follows: First, third and fifth Semester (including examination): August to December; Second, fourth and sixth Semester (including examination): January to June. In CBCS, broadly there are two programmes: 1. B.Sc. (Honours) 2. B.Sc. (Regular). The details of BSc (Honours and Regular) programme for Semester are as follows:

In **Semester -I B.Sc (Honours)**: One subject (Core course), English communication and one Generic Elective (GE) subject (Core course and GE must be two different subjects)

In **Semester -II B.Sc (Honours)**: One subject (Core course), one Generic Elective (GE) subject (Core course and GE must be two different subjects). Environmental Science (Ability Enhancement Course) is compulsory for students of all programmes.

In **Semester -III B.Sc (Honours)**: One subject (Core course), one skill enhancement course and one Generic Elective (GE) subject (Core course and GE must be two different subjects).

In **Semester -IV B.Sc (Honours)**: One subject (Core course), one skill enhancement course and one Generic Elective (GE) subject (Core course and GE must be two different subjects).

In **Semester -V B.Sc (Honours)**: One subject (Core course) and one discipline specific elective.

In **Semester -VI B.Sc (Honours)**: One subject (Core course) and one discipline specific elective.

A student's performance in the CBCS semester system shall be monitored throughout the semester by continuous assessment in both theory and practical papers. Evaluation in each theory and practical paper will be as follows:

**Internal evaluation:**

20% marks (includes sessional examinations/home assignments/ seminars/ group discussion)

**External evaluation: 80% marks**

Internal evaluation shall be based on sessional examinations, home assignments, class attendance, seminars, group discussion etc. in each semester while external evaluation shall be through a final examination at the end of the semester conducted by Dibrugarh University. Students must secure pass marks in both internal and external examinations separately. Programme Subjects to be taken Students must have minimum 75% class attendance for appearing the examination.

**Internal assessment and evaluation system (IAES)**

The college has introduced the internal assessment and evaluation system (IAES) to satisfy the norms of continuous and comprehensive evaluation of students is primarily based on the following parameters

1. Class attendance/ regularity of students in different subjects
2. Attendance in test/terminal examinations, unit test and marks secured/progress in these tests
3. Use of library services by the students.
4. Participation in seminars/discussions etc.
5. Participation in co-curricular activities
6. Teachers comments/views on a student
7. Performance in Home Assignments etc.

Students are advised to fulfil different preconditions satisfactorily to secure a higher grade in IAES. Moreover, under the Semester System in Under Graduate level under Dibrugarh University, the following norms and procedures will be followed for internal Assessment and evaluation.

1. 20% of the total marks of each paper will be allotted as the marks for Internal Assessment.
2. The marks distribution of Internal Assessment from the allotted 20% marks is as follows
  - 25% from overall attendance of student
  - 25% from 1<sup>st</sup> Sessional Examination (SEI)
  - 25% from 2<sup>nd</sup> Sessional Examination (SEII)
  - 25% from Seminar, group Discussion etc.

**Rules for Internal Assessment in B.A Programmes in Semester System**

1. The marks allotted for Internal Assessment (20% ) in each course shall be based on the following:

  - b) Sessional Examination II (Written): 25% of the marks allotted for internal assessment.
  - c) Seminar/ Group Discussion: 25 % of the marks allotted for internal assessment.
  - d) Attendance: 25 % of the marks allotted for internal assessment.
2. Each sessional examination shall be conducted by the concerned teacher(s) of the course. The setting of question paper, invigilation duty, evaluation of answer scripts for each paper shall be done by the concerned teacher(s) as a part of his/her/their normal duty. The teacher concerned shall fix the date of the sessional examination of each course complying with the Academic Calendar of the University.
3. The students shall have to write the answers in the scripts provided and duly authenticated by the college/ institute concerned.
4. After evaluation, the answer scripts should be shown to the students and corrections should be made if necessary. After this, the answer scripts should be collected back from the students.
5. There shall be no provision for "repeat"/ "betterment" in the sessional examination. If a student misses any sessional examination for unavoidable reasons, the concerned teacher may allow the student to appear in a separate examination at his/her own discretion.
6. The marks of internal assessment secured by a candidate shall be carried over to next legitimate chances.
7. If a course is taught by more than one teacher then the concerned teachers shall conduct the process of internal assessment together.
6. If any student fails to appear in internal assessment, he/she shall not be eligible to appear in the end semester examinations of the course(s) concerned. The colleges/ institutes shall notify the same prior to filling up forms for examinations.
7. At the end of the semester (before the end-semester examinations begin) the concerned College shall submit the internal assessment marks in proper format to the University.
8. The University may call the answer scripts from the colleges/institute at any time during the academic sessions.
